



ANNOTATED DRAWINGS

What is an annotated drawing?

Annotated drawings traditionally combine text and sketches to illustrate ideas of a scientific nature. However, artists have been writing notes and remarks on and around their drawings for centuries. This can be seen in the art diaries and journals of artists all across the globe.

What to do?

- In the rectangle below draw a sketch of the nominated artwork.
- Make sure you stick to the scale and composition of the original artwork.
- Write down your observations, what did you notice?

For example

- Did objects change in size as you move towards the foreground?
- Did you have to apply more pressure to create dark tones?
- Is there a clear horizon?

Now try it yourself - when finished try it with coloured pencils, pen or charcoal Did your annotations change? why/why not?
